## Featured Blog of the Month: Interview with Blogger and

### Author Grace A. Johnson

The Book Nerds' Press had the privilege of interviewing the talented author and positive blogger, Grace A. Johnson, this month. We were so honored to be able to ask her a few questions about her favorite novels, blogging journey, and writing highlights. Grace A. Johnson is the teenage Amazon bestelling indie author of *Held Captive, Prisoner at Heart*, and multiple novellas and short stories. You can find her blog, Gabbing with Grace, at graceajohnson.com

### Q. What's your favorite genre to read? Is it the same, or a different genre

### than you like to write in?

A. It's the same! I absolutely *adore* historical romance, and I have a soft spot for a well-done fantasy. Both are pretty broad genres that can encompass an array of stories, and I like the variety as both a reader and a writer!

### Q. Who's your favorite author?

A. Do I have to pick *one*? Haha! I think my top favorites are Julie Lessman, Roseanna M. White, Karen Witemeyer, Tamara Leigh, Sara Ella, and--a recent addition--Jane Austen!

### Q. What do you look for in a good book?

A. I look for a lot of things, honestly, but one above all--strong characters. If I can connect with the character and get to know them on a deep level, I can overlook a lacking plot, poor grammar, and inconsistencies. What really defines a strong character, to me, is how realistic and relatable they are (regardless of our differences) and their voice. I strive to make each character unique and real in my books, and it delights my heart when I read characters with the same strength!

# Q. Do you have a book you're fangirling (that's totally a word) over right now?

A. YES! I am always and evermore fangirling over Sara Ella's *Unblemished* trilogy--particularly the second book, *Unraveling*, and even more specifically, a certain character named Ky!

A more recent book would *definitely* be *Pride and Prejudice*. I was persuaded (that's an Austen pun, by the way) by my friends to give it a go, even though I've never considered myself an Austen fan. Y'ALL, P&P is SPECTACULAR! If you haven't read it yet, you *need* to as soon as possible! And Darcy? \*swoons\*

### Q. Do you have a favorite piece of fan art that you've made for a book? (Graphics, covers, drawings, etc.)

A. Ooh...I'm not a very good artist, so I have yet to try my hand at any drawings or illustrations. However, I have done several covers for books I am super excited about! Some by request, others simply because I love the story so much! (I'm looking at you, *Heir to His Crown*!)

I *will* be making some graphics for *Unblemished* as soon as I acquire some of that ever elusive spare time!

### Q. How long does it take you to finish writing a novel on average?

A. Average? Six months. Recently? Two years.

I have a pretty good track record--both *Held Captive* and *Prisoner at Heart* took me about six months to write, start to finish (they're 74k and 95k, respectively). My novella, *The Gift of Her Heart*, is 18k and took about two weeks. And I can write a short story in a day or two, depending on the exact length.

But my current novel, *Bound and Determined*, has been in the works for a little over a year, and I'm still not done! I hope to wrap up sometime this summer with a total of 195k, but only time will tell!

### Q. What has been your most memorable writing accomplishment?

A. My most memorable? Oy, probably publishing *Held Captive* at the age of 13! Not to say that it's worth publishing, but it was definitely an amazing accomplishment! Or, to sum my career up as one accomplishment, self-publishing seven books in two years!

Next to that would be sticking with a book for 140k (the current word count of *Bound and Determined*) *and* making Amazon's bestseller's list for Christian historical romance! *Held Captive* was #6 for, like, two days, but it still counts!

# Q. Why did you start up your blog and have there been any challenges you've faced? If so, how did you overcome them?

A. Well, my blog actually started on Goodreads, and I posted about my <u>favorite books of</u> <u>2019</u>. As time went on, whenever I thought of something interesting, I posted it there. Maybe once a month or every couple weeks, I guess, until I started a series about *Held Captive*'s writing process and, about a week later, decided to create a website.

Once I started up an "official" blog, I knew I had to start posting more, and so Gabbing with Grace just happened! I love sharing about my inner weirdness, favorite books, and writing progress!

Challenges? Hmm...probably being overwhelmed by making myself post three to five times a week! But that was all on me, and since then I've cleaned up my schedule and loosened up. Otherwise, it has been so much fun!

### Q. What's the last book you've read and what were your thoughts on it?

A. The last book I read (as in, the first one I finished out of the seven I'm reading at once) was <u>When You Found Me</u> by Anna Augustine. A lot of my friends (or friends' friends) on Goodreads were saying amazing things about the novella collection, so I checked it out, saw that it was indie-published by a young Christian writer, and then downloaded it on KU!

It had a lot of spelling and grammar errors, but overall, I think the writing was really strong and the romances were so cute! I really enjoyed reading it!

### Q. What would you say is your interesting writing quirk?

A. Hmm...I don't guess I've ever thought about that! I'm not sure what qualifies as a writing quirk, but I do know there is one thing I do differently from almost every writer.

I don't draft. Like, at all. I started out knowing nothing about writing, so I didn't know drafting existed until, um, a year or two ago, maybe? So I've been writing all this time just *writing*. As a perfectionist, it's difficult for me to speed write and not pay close attention to every little detail, so I'm not complaining about my process. But it is definitely something that sets me apart. I don't really think I have any quirks, per se.

But when it finally does, in the shape of a dead woman floating in the water after a storm, Frannie makes split second decisions and becomes Miss Emmeline Coates whose father was killed in the

shipwreck from the night before. Frannie will have you wrapped up in this adventure that I say is one of the best historical fiction books ever.

#### 3. *Cloak Of The Light* by Chuck Black

Drew Carter's whole life is filled with tragedy, but things only get worse when an accident happens that leaves Drew Carter blind. However, one day he miraculously regains his sight except now he can see invaders that no one else can. This book (and the series to follow) was so good. I loved how Black weaves elements of the spiritual battle in an amazing, action-packed story. Drew and Sydeny were so relatable and fun to read about. I was rooting for Drew from the moment I read chapter one. I've always been a fan of anything Chuck Black writes and this series does not disappoint!

### 4. The Watchmaker's Daughter by C. J. Archer

India Steele is good with watches. Just as her father was. But when her father dies, the shop that should have been left to her, is taken by her doublecrossing fiance. She needs to find work. But all the other watchmakers won't take her on. So when the American Mr. Glass hires her to help him find a certain watchmaker, she jumps at the chance. But can she betray him after he saved her life. This jaw dropping mystery will have you following leads and making a list of possible suspects. Follow India Steele on this great adventure and find the answer to the questions.

### 5. Words On Fire by Jennifer A. Nielsen

Audra is living in Russian-occupied Lithuania in 1893 when her parents are one day arrested for being involved in something Audra doesn't know. To have any hope of rescuing her parents, Audra must join the book smugglers and embark on dangerous and unknown paths. This book was so beautiful. I read it in three days and when I had finished, I just wanted to sit and think about all that had happened. The plot was very well paced and kept me clinging for the next word, sentence, and chapter. However, my favorite parts were the characters, Audra especially. Her character arc was so real, raw, and beautiful it warmed my heart and made me want to go through whatever journeys she faced. And the ending was just amazing and almost made me cry happy tears. I love it when a story clings to my heart and makes me want to cry, but it's even better when I want to cry because I am so happy. Those are the kind of stories that stay with you.

### 6. Fawkes by Nadine Brandes

Thomas Fawkes has caught the Stone Plague spreading through 17th century England and is turning to stone. Now his only hope is to join his father in a treasonous plot to blow up parliament. I, in one word, adore this story. The characters, plot, message, world, everything was so gorgeous and well developed. This story just grabbed my heart and I couldn't help but soak in

every single word. And Thomas' character arc was just so well-done. This story was amazing and left me in awe and wonder days after ending it. I recommend it to anyone who is looking for a story to tug at their heart or maybe wanting a fantastical take on the Gunpowder Plot of 1605!
